



GALLOPING INTO GROWTH

The Magic of Hippotherapy



As the program grew, so did the understanding of hippotherapy's benefits, which extend far beyond the physical. While hippotherapy is well-known for improving core strength, posture, and balance, it also enhances coordination and range of motion for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). The movement of the horse helps improve sensory integration, allowing riders better control over their own movements. For many individuals with IDD, a horses' gentle, non-threatening nature provides a calming environment, and the bond formed between rider and horse fosters trust, confidence, and a sense of accomplishment.

The first metal gates for the NMRC hippotherapy program were donated by the NMRC Friends Organization, creating the initial round riding pen. As the program continued to grow, NMRC supported further expansion, upgrading the riding area and purchasing additional equipment.

Today, NMRC's Hippotherapy program continues to thrive, thanks to the expertise of Amanda Pounds from Therapy Services and Jennifer Hughes from Educational Services. Jennifer has a BA in Therapeutic Horsemanship from St. Andrews University and a Masters in Special Education. Both are highly qualified, having completed the "Hippotherapy Treatment Principles" program through the American Hippotherapy Association at Mississippi State University.

Each year, Dr. Hayles, Director of NMRC, selects a charitable organization for her governing body Christmas gift. This past Christmas, she graciously chose the Hippotherapy program at NMRC. The generosity of Dr. Hayles and those who contribute to this program ensure a meaningful therapeutic experience for the clients of NMRC. In every horse's rhythmic stride, there is healing, growth, and a reminder that sometimes, the best therapy happens when you form a connection with something as simple and profound as a horse.
